Message from EWC President Charles E. Morrison and Board Chairman R. Brian Tsujimura



It is sometimes said we are on the threshold of an “Asian century,” but it might be more accurate to say that it will be a global century with an Asia Pacific leadership core. While Asian power is on the rise, world power as a whole is going to more diffusely spread, with no single power as dominant as the United States has been. This means that if global issues are to be effectively addressed, international cooperation becomes all the more essential, and particularly among Asia Pacific countries including China, Japan, India and the United States. In this era, the East-West Center will play critical training and convening roles in helping to develop the international-minded leaders required of our region and also in helping current leaders at all levels of society better address issues of common concern.

In 2014, the Center continued to develop initiatives intended to impact present and future thought leaders in our region. Our year began with the East-West Philanthropists Summit bringing together leading philanthropists from China and the U.S. to learn from each other’s experiences and concerns. In March, the International Media Conference in Yangon brought together more than 500 media professionals from 31 countries to discuss and promote press freedom in a way previously impossible in Burma. The Center was honored in July when Secretary of State John Kerry visited to deliver his first major policy speech on U.S. engagement in the region. Pacific island youth leaders converged in Samoa for the second ‘Future Leaders of the Pacific’ conference; the Brunei-U.S. English Language Enrichment Project for ASEAN advanced into a new phase of teaching apprenticeships; and among our research activities, EWC hosted a series of expert dialogues focusing on key issues of North Pacific economic cooperation.

The dream we share of a better, safer world requires us to work together as we navigate toward a future of regional leadership for a world community.



Events connected with the **2014 International Media Conference in Myanmar** included major addresses from both Nobel Laureate Aung San Suu Kyi and Minister of Information U Ye Htut. Attendees were struck by the frankness of the discussions among participants from all sides of the Myanmar media spectrum, from government representatives to journalists who had been imprisoned or banned during the years of military rule. ♦ EastWestCenter.org/imc2014

Highlight: Media Programs

The Center continued to break new ground in 2014 with its seminar programs for journalists, including the fourth biennial EWC International Media Conference held in Yangon, Myanmar, in March. More than 500 media professionals from 31 countries attended the conference in the emerging nation that until just a few years ago had some of the most repressive media controls in the world. Also during the year, EWC media programs conducted a workshop in Seoul on reporting on human rights issues and a reunion conference of Pakistani media alumni in Islamabad that addressed issues of youth at risk in the country. ♦ EastWestCenter.org/journalismfellowships

In August, **U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry** delivered a policy speech at EWC in which he outlined what he termed the United States' "ambitious agenda" of long-term engagement in Asia and the Pacific. "We know that America's security and prosperity are closely and increasingly linked to the Asia Pacific," Kerry said, adding that "President Obama and I strongly support your (East-West Center) mission of bringing people together to think creatively about the future of our role in the region."

Pacific Islands Development Program Co-Director Gerard Finin led the U.S. delegation of a **multinational mission to observe Fiji's national election** in September — its first since a military coup in 2006. After the election, Finin wrote that coup leader Voreqe Bainimarama's "mandate to lead Fiji now represents a choice freely made by the electorate," but it is also just "one important step to a more robust democratic society."

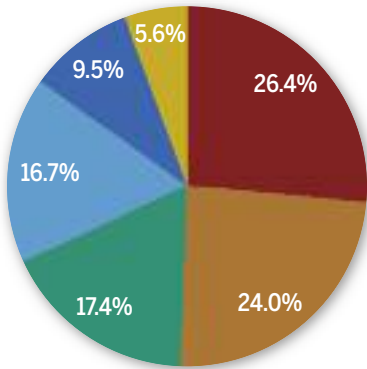


Public Engagement

Financial Review

For the fiscal year ending September 30, 2014, the East-West Center had total assets of \$45,157,609, total liabilities of \$3,525,543 and total net assets of \$41,632,066. Revenues and support for the year amounted to \$34,423,094. The revenue sources included: \$16,700,000 from the U.S. government appropriation, which covered most core operating and physical plant costs; program costs were primarily funded by \$5,060,115 from other U.S. government awards; \$6,330,793 from other contracts and grants; and \$6,332,186 from other sources.

East-West Center Foundation

The East-West Center Foundation is a private nonprofit organization, established to broaden and diversify private support for the Center. Private contributions, grants, and sponsorship, supplemented by competed funding from governments of the Asia Pacific region and the United States are used to support EWC programs and student scholarships.

For more than 50 years, the East-West Center has been promoting better relations and understanding among the people and nations of the United States, Asia, and the Pacific through cooperative study, research, and dialogue. Established by the U.S. Congress in 1960, the Center serves as a resource for information and analysis on critical issues of common concern, bringing people together to exchange views, build expertise, and develop policy options.

Officially known as the Center for Cultural and Technical Interchange between East and West, the Center is a U.S.-based independent, public, nonprofit institution for public diplomacy with international governance, staffing, students, and participants.

The Center's 21-acre Honolulu campus, adjacent to the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, is located midway between Asia and the U.S. mainland and features research, residential, and international conference facilities. The Center's Washington, D.C. office focuses on preparing the United States for an era of growing Asia Pacific prominence.
